Learn what God made on day 5.

Day 5— Then God said, Let the waters abound with an abundance the living creatures, and let birds fly above the earth across the face of the firmament of the heavens. So God created great sea creatures, and every living thing that moves, with which the waters abounded, according to their kind, and every winged bird according to its kind: and God saw that it was good. (Begin with the circles 1-4 on the board) It is now the 5th day of creation. The world God has made is more beautiful than words can describe. But even though it is beautiful, it is a silent and empty

world. The only sound that can be heard is the breeze whispering through the trees. But God is not planning an empty world. So let's wait for God's voice again to see what He is making today. Soon we hear God saying "Let the waters bring forth abundantly." We turn and look toward the sea and we can see things moving. We see a water spout and then great big whale. There are dolphins, porpoises and seals. I am sure He enjoys making so many different kinds of sea creatures. There are fish of every color. There are starfish, sea horses, crabs, lobsters, shrimp and all kinds of animals that live in shells. The waters are so full of so many interesting things it was hard to know what to look at.

But wait, this isn't the end of the day. We hear God speak again. "Let the birds fly above the earth. Then, what a marvelous sight! Just look at them! Learn About the Polar Bear

Do you know very much about polar bears? I found some very interesting facts about them. Polar bears live along shore and on sea ice in the icy cold Arctic. When sea ice forms over the ocean in cold weather, many polar bears head out onto the ice to hunt for seals. They can end up many miles from shore. A polar bear may also hunt by swimming beneath the ice. Polar bears swim using their large front paws to push themselves through the water and use their back



legs to steer. Polar bears have been known to swim up to 100 miles at a stretch. When the warm weather causes the sea ice to melt, polar bears move back toward shore. Paw pads with rough surfaces help prevent polar bears from slipping on the ice. Adult males can weigh as much as 1500 pounds and be 10 feet in length. Polar bears are the largest of all bears.

They have fur and skin that allow them to absorb sunlight for warmth. Despite what we think, a polar bear's fur is not white. Each hair is a clear hollow tube. Polar bears look white because each hollow hair reflects the light. On sunny days, it traps the sun's infrared heat and keeps the bear warm at 98 degrees F (when they're resting). Polar bear fur is oily and water repellent. The hairs don't mat when wet, allowing the polar bears to easily shake free of water and any ice that may form after swimming. Their fat insulates them in cold water. Polar bears live about 25 years in the wild.



The babies are much smaller than human babies when they're born. They are the size of a rat and weigh little more than a pound. They can grow to full man size in a year if they have lots of food. Baby polar bears are very curious, the same as young children, and they need to investigate their surroundings to learn what exists around them.

A reservation is a place where some Indian tribes still live. Many years ago most Indians lived on reservations, but many now live in cities and houses just like we do.




